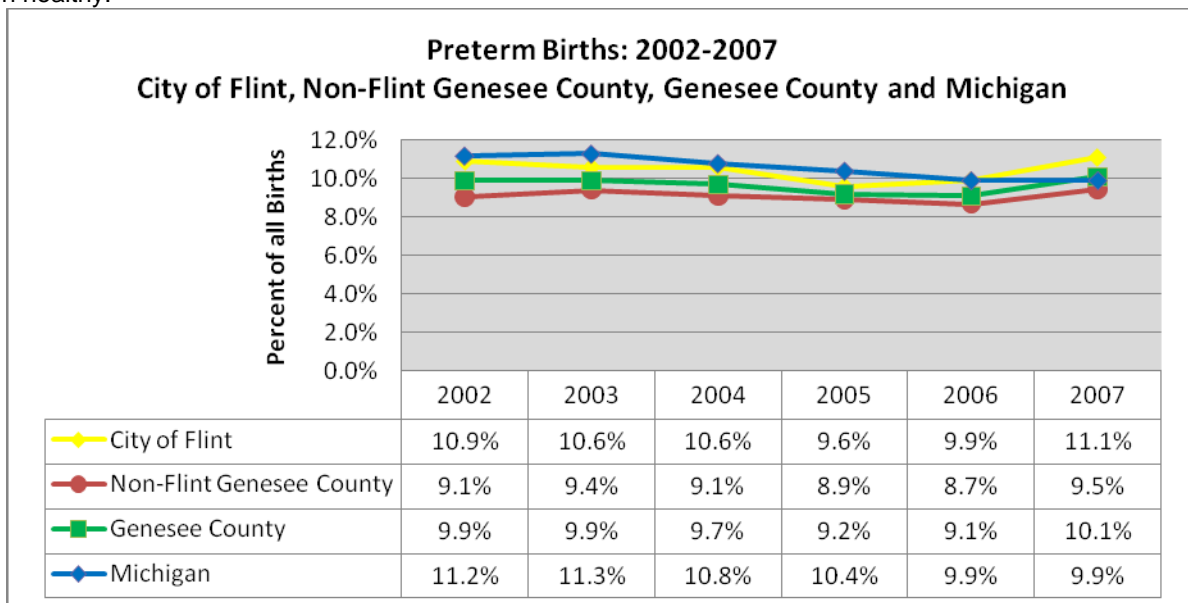


Fact Sheet 2.8 Preterm Births

Preterm births are those that occur prior to the 37th week of gestation. Preterm babies are at greater than normal risk for getting sick or dying during the first year of life. Preventing preterm births increases the chances that the baby will be born healthy.



There have been significant gains reported in the most recent five year period.

- Between 2002 and 2006, the rate of premature births overall in Michigan has dropped.
- During the same period, the rate of premature births to Flint residents declined to the same rate experienced in Michigan as a whole.
- The rate for non-Flint Genesee County residents remains slightly lower than the rate in Michigan as a whole.

BEYOND THE NUMBERS

According to the data for the reported decade, consistency has been achieved in the area of premature births. It is a “good news” consistency, with city, county, and state-wide percentages within a few points of each other. It demonstrates the interrelatedness of varied socio-economic and health factors. Addressing pre-natal and neo-natal care on multiple fronts makes sense! This paves the way for a united effort to further improve chances for Michigan children to be born at full-term, healthy, with less risk of illness and/or deaths. Decreased numbers of premature births should translate to reduced infant mortality.

INTERVENTION EFFORTS

- Premature births and low birthweight babies are focus areas for March of Dimes programs. This includes education and information about pre-term labor and delivery, and the care of these infants, as well as research into causes for the occurrences.
- Maternal and Infant Health Program (formerly MSS/ISS) services nursing, educational, social work, nutrition, case management and home visits for pregnant women and infants (Medicaid).
- Led by the Health Department, Healthy Start serves mothers and children 0-2 in the 48503, 04, and 48458 zip codes. The providers assist with housing, food and nutrition, baby clothes, making and keeping doctor appointments, advice on infant bonding, and health care concerns.

Definitions: The percentage is based on all live births.
